## **Sunday school lesson - Upper Primary**

BIG IDEA	God is creator
Bible Reading	Genesis 1-2
Preparation	<b>Read</b> Genesis 1-2: There are many ways that people have interpreted this section of the bible, ranging from completely literal to figurative and poetic. The children in your class may well have questions about how the biblical account of creation tallies with the theory of evolution. The first and foremost goal of the lesson is to communicate what the bible teaches about how the world came to be. If the question of evolution arises, draw out the fact that <i>God was there</i> , in the beginning (Gen 1:1), before anything was made, and he ensured this account was written down so that even though we weren't there, we can know how it happened too. God insists that <i>He</i> is the one who made the world, which means it isn't just chance or luck. This has big implications for our lives, which will be discussed further in the Family Bible Time material for this week. If questions come up early in the lesson, it may be helpful to suggest that first, you find out what God has to say about this, and then discuss how that compares with what other people might have to say. If evolution is a big issue for the children in your class, you might like to arrange a separate session to go into more detail about the different arguments (ideally don't get dragged into this during the lesson).
	Take home message: The children should go away knowing that God made the world, and start to think through what that means for our relationship with him.  Prepare for "Getting Started": Write/print out a list of ingredients for a cake (e.g. flour, sugar, eggs etc), as well as bullet point instructions (e.g. mix dry ingredients, bake in oven). Write/print out a list of objects needed to make a model aeroplane (e.g. wood, paint, glueetc) as well as bullet point instructions (e.g. glue wing to fuselage, paint on windows). Cut them all up into individual words/bullet points and mix them up.
Getting Started	Give the children the mixed up words for making a cake and a model aeroplane. Tell the children they need to sort the words into two piles in order to make two separate things. The piles also need to be sorted into "things you need to make this" and "instructions for making this". (Depending on the size of the class you might want to make two or more sets of words and split them into teams). Get them to guess what the two things being made are.
Finding Out	Explain that today we are going right back to the very beginning of time. Before there was anything. Before the world or the universe existed.

Bible Reading	Genesis 1-2

Read Genesis 1:9  • Q: What did God do to make sky and land appear? Read Genesis 1:11  • Q: What did God do to make plants and trees appear?  > Help the children see that God didn't need to do anything except speak. Refer back to the "Getting Started" activity. What needs to happen to make a cake or model aeroplane? Need to buy things, mix things, stick things, colour in things, etc. God only needs to speak to make a whole world!  > You may want to try and get them to imagine what it would have been like to be there, to hear God speaking and then see things appear around you.  Finally, God had finished making everything; he looked at everything he had made and was pleased with everything.  Read Genesis 1:4  • Q: What did God think about the light that he had made?  Read Genesis 1:10  • Q: What did God think about the trees and plants that he had made?  Read Genesis 1:12  • Q: What did God think about the trees and plants that he had made?  > Talk about when we make things, they don't always turn out the way we want them to. Bible Reading	Genesis 1-2
Preparation	<b>Read</b> Genesis 1-2: God was there in the beginning (Gen 1:1), before anything was made, and he ensured this account was written down so even though we weren't there, we can know how it happened too. God insists that He is the one who made the world, which means it isn't just chance or luck. This has big implications for our lives, which will be discussed further in the Family Bible Time material for this week.
	<b>Take home message:</b> The children should go away knowing that God made the world, and realise how great he is.
	<b>Prepare</b> for "Getting Started": Draw/print pictures of ingredients for a cake (e.g. flour, sugar, eggs etc). Draw/print pictures of objects needed to make a Lego car (e.g. wheels, doors, windows, etc). Cut them all up into individual pictures and mix them up.
	For later in the lesson, draw/print pictures of things needed to make a cake (e.g. oven, mixing bowl, wooden spoon). Or alternatively bring in actual objects.
Getting Started	Give the children the mixed up pictures of ingredients / objects for making a cake and a Lego car. Tell the children they need to sort the pictures into two piles in order to make two separate things. Either tell them or get them to guess what two things are being made.
Finding Out	Explain that today we are going right back to the very beginning of time. Before there was anything. Before any of us were born, or your grandparents were born, even before the world was here.
God made	Read Genesis 1:1
1. All things out of	Q: What does "created" mean?
nothing (Gen 1:1)	Explain this means to make something. Ask the children to tell you about things they have made.
	<ul> <li>Q: What would I need to be able to make a cake?</li> <li>Refer back to the "Getting Started" activity (use the pictures to help). Emphasise</li> </ul>
	that we always need ingredients/objects to be able to make something. We can't just make something appear without first having something to start with.  But when God made the world, there wasn't anything around for him to use  Q: So how did God make the world?

	Q: What did God think about the light that he had made?

	Get the children to list lots of things in the world that God made. Make sure
	they realise that also includes people.

	God is more powerful and greater than anyone in the entire world.
	> Even though God is more powerful and amazing than anyone in the whole
	world, he wants to be friends with us! We will find out more about that over the
	coming weeks.
