Big Idea	God is our rightful ruler
Bible Passage	Genesis 2:9, 16-17; 3:1-24
Big Idea Bible Passage Preparation	God is our rightful ruler Genesis 2:9, 16-17; 3:1-24 Read Genesis 2:5 – 3:24 This story represents the most catastrophic event in human history. God had made a perfect environment for Adam and Eve to live in, and placed them at the very centre of his creation. He established himself as their provider by generously, lovingly and abundantly taking care of all their needs. God also clearly established his role as their ruler. Adam and Eve were given explicit instructions, with equally clear consequences for disobedience. They were living under the provision and protection of the best possible ruler, and yet knowingly chose to rebel against this rule. The prospect of "being like God" outweighed their present benefits, and they succumbed to the devil's lie, with disastrous consequences. They discovered that rejecting God's rule, far from bringing fulfilment and pleasure, instead brought pain, suffering, broken relationships with each other and with God, and ultimately death. This pattern has repeated itself again and again throughout human history. We doubt the goodness and generosity of God's rule in our lives. We believe the lie that ruling our own lives will work out better, and reject God's rightful reign over us. Thankfully, the story does not end there. Even here, right at the beginning of human rebellion, God already has his rescue plan in place. Genesis 3:15 offers the first glimpse of a restored order, where God again establishes his rightful rule. Children may have questions as to why God allowed sin to enter the world. If this
	question is raised, it is important to emphasise human culpability. However, this does not negate God's sovereignty. In the end, we can't fully know or understand how both of these things can be true. We can only pass on what the bible teaches – God is completely in control of everything, but we are also completely responsible for our actions – and trust that God is more knowledgeable and wiser than us! Try not to get too side-tracked by this, however. Keep the focus of the lesson on the fact that Adam and Eve chose to rebel against God, although he had given them no cause to do so.
	Take home message: Adam and Eve chose to rebel against God, their rightful ruler. We naturally choose to do the same thing. But God is the best possible ruler for our lives. Prepare. Write the word "God" in large letters on a piece of card. Stick some card to the back as a stand so it stands up by itself. Put 2 slits in the top of the card so that a crown can slot into them. Write the words "Adam and Eve" on another piece of card and make a stand for the back and slits in the top. Make a crown out of card. Have card, scissors and colouring pencils ready for the children in your class to make crowns also.

Read Genesis 3:1 Q: Talk about the serpent's question to Eve. What was he trying to do? Explain that the serpent was trying to get Eve to doubt God's word. Read Genesis 3:2-3 • *Q: What did Eve answer?* Point out that Eve remembered what God had commanded, and what would happen if she disobeyed. Read Genesis 3:4-5 Q: What had God said would be the consequence if they disobeyed him and ate from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil? Q: What did the serpent say instead would happen to them? The serpent tried to get Eve to believe that God had got it wrong. They wouldn't die after all, instead they would be like God if they ate from the tree. > Explain that by saying that Eve would be like God, he was saying that she could be her own ruler, instead of having to submit to God's rule. Eve could get to decide what was right and wrong, instead of obeying God and trusting what he said. Read Genesis 3:6 In the end, Eve listened to the snake. She liked the idea of being like God and getting to rule her own life instead of God, so she ate the fruit from the tree. She also gave some to Adam and he ate it as well. (Transfer the crown from the card with "God" written on it to the one with "Adam

and Eve" written on it)

- Q: There were 2 special trees in the garden what where they called?

Read Genesis 2:16-17

- Q: Which tree were they not allowed to eat from?
- Q: What did God say would happen if they ate from this tree?
- Explain that God made it very clear that he was their ruler. He would look after them and provide for them. (Use the visual aid prepared earlier put the crown you made onto the card with the word "God" written on it.)
- Adam and Eve's job was to obey God. He gave them a very clear rule to follow. They knew exactly what they were supposed to do, and what would happen if they disobeyed.

2. The test (Gen 3:1-7)

- Q: Adam and Eve must have enjoyed eating things from all the different trees. What sorts of things do you think they ate?
- > But one day, everything changed. Eve had a visitor...

Read Genesis 3:1

- Q: What did the serpent ask Eve?
- Explain that the serpent was trying to get Eve to think that God can't be trusted.

Read Genesis 3:2-3

- Q: What did Eve answer?
- Point out that Eve remembered what God had commanded, and what would happen if she disobeyed.

Read Genesis 3:4-5

- Q: Do you remember what God said would happen if they disobeyed him and ate from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil?
- The serpent tried to get Eve to believe that God had got it wrong. They wouldn't die after all, instead they would be like God if they ate from the tree
- Explain that by saying that Eve would be like God, he was saying that she could be the one in charge, instead of having to obey God.

Read Genesis 3:6

- In the end, Eve listened to the snake. She liked the idea of being like God and getting to be in charge instead of God, so she ate the fruit from the tree. She also gave some to Adam and he ate it as well.
- (Transfer the crown from the card with "God" written on it to the one with "Adam and Eve" written on it)

He looked after them and gave them everything they needed. (Use the visual aid prepared earlier – put the crown you made onto the card with the word "God" written on it.) Now, instead of being a beautiful garden, it was a place of sadness and pain. • Q: Which was better – when God was in charge, or when Adam and Eve tried to be in charge of their lives? So What? > Use the crowns the children made earlier. Give examples of when we try to be the boss instead of God. With each example, ask them to put their crown on their head. Talk about the fact that this is what we are doing when we try to take

	over from God. Show that we were never meant to wear the crown though – it
	doesn't fit us! God is the only one who can do the job of being in charge.

Alternative to worksheet	Continue to decorate crowns. Get the children to draw a picture of themselves on the crown and then cross it out. Write "God" on the crown instead.
