BIG IDEA	God saves sinners
Bible Reading	Genesis 12:1-9
Preparation	Read Genesis 11:10 – 12:9. The events that occur in these verses come as a profound surprise, given all that has happened since God created the world. There was the fall, and then the flood, and finally the rebellion at Babel. Surely the time has come for God to give up on his creation, and judge them as they deserve! And yet this is not the next event we read. Instead, "The Lord said to Abram". God speaks. He chooses yet again to reveal himself to human creatures. And the person to whom he speaks is Abram. Abram and his family were at the time living in Ur (see Acts 7:2-4), a place renown for pagan worship, most likely of the Moon God. Joshua 24:2 makes it clear that Abram and his family also participated in this worship. God seeks out followers from amongst those who are his enemies and this is still how he operates today. He calls the unexpected to follow him, those who are his enemies (1 Corinthians 1:22-31). Not only that, he promises to bless Abram in terms of descendants, land, personal protection, and to be the means by which the whole earth will be blessed. Abram responds to the call with simple obedience. Hebrews 11:8-9 commends Abram's faith that leads him to follow God's call, even without knowing exactly where he was going. We then follow Abram to Shechem, where he builds an altar and worships God, in the midst of his pagan neighbours. This section of the narrative ends with God reiterating his promises to Abram, despite seemingly impossible circumstances, and Abram choosing to trust God in the face of these difficulties. Take home message: God saves those who do not deserve to be saved. Our response
	should be to obey his call and worship him. Prepare for "Getting Started": Take a picture of something you own that is very precious to you. Bring some paper and pencils. Also get hold of a map that shows Ur, Haran, and Shechem (to be used during the lesson).
Getting Started	What is the most precious thing you own? Get the children to talk about the one thing they own that they would not want to lose. Maybe get them to draw a picture of it. Show them a picture of something you own that is precious to you. Has anyone ever done something to you that was very hurtful? Maybe someone at school? How did it make you feel? What did it make you want to do? What if the next day you went up to that person and gave them something that was very precious to you Use their examples to illustrate this. Did the other person deserve this gift from you? That is exactly what God does — as we will find out today.
Finding Out 1. Abram's pagan background (Genesis 11:27-32)	 Review the story from last week. Point out that yet again, the people that God had created had rebelled against him and tried to live without God. Q: If you were in God's place, and the people you had created kept rejecting you, how would you feel? What would you want to do with these people? God would be completely just in giving up on people and punished them as they deserved. But this is not what happens. Read Genesis 11:27-28

	Q: What would you do if you were Abram?
	Read Genesis 12:4-7
	• Q: What did Abram do?
	Abram simply went! No questions, no argument, no bargaining. He just obeyed.
	> Use the map to show where Shechem was.
	• Q: What promise did God repeat to Abram in Shechem? (v.7)
	➤ God repeats his promise to give this very land to Abram's children. But there are
	two problems. Someone else was currently living in the land (v6) and Sarai his wife
	can't have children (11:30).
	Q: How does Abram react to this second time God makes him a promise?
	➤ He again shows his trust in God by building an alter and worshipping God, despite
	the apparent difficulties of his situation.
So What?	God doesn't save people who deserve to be saved. He calls people who were once his
	enemies. He calls us to follow him too. Q: How will you respond to this? If you are
	already following God, then thank God that he chose you, his enemy, to be his friend.
	Pray for people you know who seem unlikely to be saved. God can save them too!

	Prepare for "Getting Started": If possible, ask the children in advance of the Sunday School lesson to bring along something that they own that they really love. Bring something along that is precious to you as well. If it isn't possible to ask this in advance, bring paper and pencils so they can draw things they own during the lesson.
Getting Started	Get the children to show you something they own that they love and have brought in with them. Or alternatively, talk about something they own that they wouldn't want to lose. Show them something you own that is precious to you. Has anyone ever done something to you that upset you? (Get some examples from the children) How did it make you feel? What did it make you want to do? What if the next day you went up to that person and gave them something that was very precious to you. Use their examples to illustrate this. If they have it with them, act out giving it to someone else. Would you do this for someone who had hurt you? Today we will find that this is exactly what God does for us.

	we have done things that make him sad. He wants us to obey him, just like Abram did.
