BIG IDEA	God can do anything
Bible Reading	Genesis 18:1-15; 21:1-7
Preparation	Read Genesis 18:1-15; 21:1-7 It has now been 24 years since Abraham left Ur. Abraham and Sarah still remain childless. The situation has now passed from the unlikely to the impossible. The phrase in verse 11 that Sarah was "past the age of childbearing" makes this abundantly clear. Why did God wait so long to fulfil his promise? It seems that God delights to work through impossible situations, so that we may believe (John 11:15). When God works through the impossible, it becomes clear that it His work and not ours. We learn to rely on him, rather than on ourselves. Note that Genesis 18:14 needs to be taken in the context of a promise. God is fully able to make good on his promise, so we need not doubt. A similar verse can be found in Luke 1:37, which is also in the context of a promise that has been given. If Genesis 15 showed us that God has the WILL to keep his promises, Genesis 18 and 21 show that he also has the ABILITY to keep his promises. That makes God's promises a very sure thing!

Getting Started	Tell the children you are going to tell them a story about a village. The people in the village needed to grow some more crops. They found a suitable field, but there was a large boulder in the middle of the field that needed to be moved (show the picture of the boulder). The weak man ("Fred") addresses the villages (show the picture of the weak looking man). He confidently promises that tomorrow he will come and move the boulder, all by himself. Now show them the picture of the strong man. Say that next "Arnold" comes and addresses the villages. He also makes the same promise that the next day he will come and move the boulder. Of the two men, whose promise would you believe? Talk about the fact that is it one thing to want to keep your promise, but it is another thing to have the ability to keep your promise. The weak man might have wanted to keep his promise, but wasn't able to. Whereas the strong man both wanted to, and was able to keep his promise.
Finding Out	Remember from last week, God had made Abram a promise.

God visits Abraham (Genesis 18:1-8)	 Q: What did God promise Abram (land, children, to be with him, blessing to the world) God had given the promise to Abram when he left Ur when he was 75 years old, then repeated it as we heard last week. He again repeated the promise to Abram several years later. At that time, he even changed Abram's name to Abraham, as another sign that he would keep his promise. Abraham was now 99 years old. It had been 24 years since he left Ur – and still no children. Q: How do you feel if you had to wait 24 years for something to happen? Read Genesis 18:1-8

18:14; 21:1-7)	➤ God had given a promise to Abraham, and Sarah showed by laughing that she didn't
	believe God was able to keep his promise. God is saying that whatever he promises,
	he is able to do, so you can always trust that he will keep his promises.
	Last week we learnt that God's desire (what he wants to do) is to keep his promises.
	Today we learn that he has the power to keep his promise. So he both WANTS to keep
	his promises, and is ABLE to keep his promises. That makes God's promises very
	certain! (Refer back to the "Getting Started" activity)
	Sure enough, exactly one year later, Sarah has a baby.
	Read Genesis 21:1-7
	• Q: What name did Abraham give to the new baby? What does this name mean?
	> "Isaac" means laughter (v.3 and 6). Sarah had laughed in disbelief, now she laughs
	with joy that God has done the impossible.
	Q: Why do you think God waited until it was impossible for Abraham and Sarah to
	have children before he gave them a baby?
	By using an impossible situation, it became very clear that God was the one who was
	responsible for Isaac's birth. It reminded Abraham and Sarah to rely on God, not on
	themselves. God often does this! For example, the birth of Jesus (Luke 1:37).

So, he goes off to get Sarah to make some bread, while he goes off to arrange for a cow to be killed! (A bit more effort that we normally go to for lunch!) While they are eating lunch, the visitors pass on a message from God

	Q: What did Sarah do when she heard God say this? Why did she laugh?
	Sarah knows it is impossible for 100-year olds to have babies – that's why she
	laughed. She knew it is impossible.

18:14; 21:1-7)	God told Abraham that nothing is too hard for God. He can do anything! That means
	that if he promises to do something, he will make sure that it happens.
	Even though Abraham and Sarah were very old, God had promised they would have
	a child, so he would make sure that they did.
	➤ Refer back to the "Getting Started" activity – God is like the strong man. If he says
	he will do something, and he is always able to do what he says, because he is a big,
	strong God.

	Exactly one year later, Sarah had a baby boy, exactly as God had promised.
	Read Genesis 21:3
	Q: What name did Abraham give to the new baby?
	➤ "Isaac" means laughter (v.3 and 6). Sarah had laughed because she didn't believe
	God, now she laughed because she was so happy!
So What?	Sometimes, God's promises can seem like they are impossible. Give examples of
	promises that seem impossible E.g. He promises that after we die, his people will live
	forever with him. God can do anything, which means he can keep any promise that he
	has made. You can trust God to keep his promises because he can do anything.
