Sunday school lesson - Upper Primary

BIG IDEA	Trust that God's way is right
Bible Reading	Numbers 20:1-13
Preparation	Read Numbers 20; 27:12-14 Deuteronomy 32:48-52; Psalm 106:32-33. The Israelites have lost out on entering the promised land because of their lack of trust in God, shown by their lack of obedience. They continue in their old ways, however. The very next crisis they face results in the same response of complaining and wanting to return to Egypt. God demonstrates remarkable patience and forbearance; his response to the complaint is to provide abundant water. The contrast between God and the Israelites could not be more stark. Numbers 20:13 summarises the incident as the time when Israel quarrelled with God, and God proved he was holy. God's holiness is at the heart of what is at stake in this incident. Moses' punishment, at first sight might seem harsh. But the reason given is that Moses "did not trust in me enough to honour me as holy" (see also Deuteronomy 32:48-52). Moses presumed to put his own spin on God's command, and thus didn't faithfully portray God for who he was. Through his words, ("must we") God comes across as sharing Moses' petulance and frustration. As a result, Moses risked the people seeing a distorted view of God. It was necessary to show Moses and the Israelites that it matters how we view God. We don't get to decide what God is like. He is holy, and we must submit to this, and make sure we are faithful in how we portray him to others. Take home message: Trust that God is holy, and his way is right. Prepare for "Getting Started": Make a line with "Completely Good" at one end and
Getting Started	"Completely Bad" at the other end. Show the line from good to bad. Ask where they would put themselves on the line. Talk about how it changes all the time, and that we are never completely good. Where would God be on the line?
Finding Out 1. Another crisis and more complaining (Numbers 20:1-5)	 Recap: The Israelites had made it to the edge of the promised land. Q: What was the land like? What was the problem? How did the Israelites respond? What was the consequence? Read Numbers 20:1-5 Q: What was the new problem the Israelites had to face? Q: How did they react? Does that remind you of how they reacted in the past? Q: What do you think the Israelites deserved God to say to them? We expect to hear next that God judged the people for their complaining. He had shown them again and again that he was with them and that he could be trusted.
2. God again shows mercy (Numbers 20:6-7)	 Read Numbers 20:6-8 Q: How did God react to the people, yet again, complaining and wanting to return to Egypt? The people deserved punishment. Again, and again they had complained against God, even for rescuing them from slavery! But God doesn't treat them as they deserve. He is patient, merciful and generous.

Talk through a scenario where a friend complains that they don't have any shoes. You give them a pair of yours, but instead of saying thank you, they complain they don't have a hat, so you give them yours. Instead of saying thank you they complain that the don't have enough shirts.... Etc. How would you feel about that person? How would you be tempted to react? ➤ God is not like us! He is described in the bible as being "holy". That means he is not just a different version of us, he is completely different. In particular, he never reacts in even a slightly sinful way. What he does is always good and right. Relate back to "Getting Started" activity. God is not even on the same line as us! He is not just a better version of us. He is completely different. The best version of us would still have sinful thoughts, even though we might manage to control it. 3. God's holiness (Numbers 20:8-13) Read Numbers 20:9-11 Q: What did Moses do? How is that different to what God commanded him? Moses didn't trust God's way of providing water. Instead he decided he could do things differently. He presumed it didn't matter if he didn't do it exactly the way God had commanded him. > Remember that the Israelites had not heard God's instruction to Moses. All they knew about God's response, was through what Moses said and did. Q: Based on Moses' actions and words, what would the Israelites think of God? Q: How as that different to what God actually said to Moses? Moses was representing God to the people. Because of how Moses acted, he risked the whole nation of Israel getting a wrong view of God. They could have thought God was frustrated and resentful, instead of merciful and generous. Read Numbers 20:12-13 Q: What punishment does God give to Moses and Aaron? Q: What reason does he give for the punishment? Q: How did God show that he was holy, even despite Moses' actions? ➤ God acted differently to how any of us would act. Despite the Israelites complaining, and Moses' disobedience, he still mercifully and abundantly provided water. So What? Sometimes we are tempted to try and fit God into our way of thinking, instead of accepting God as the way he has revealed himself in the bible. > Talk through examples, e.g. he forgives anyone who repents, even those we don't like. Or that we need him to save us, we can't save ourselves. Each time we try to fit God into what we want, rather than what he really is, we diminish his holiness in our minds. And then we won't worship and honour him the way we should. It is also important that we are faithful in how we represent God to others, even if we are mocked for believing certain things. Because the consequence is not just for us but also for others, who may never find out the truth of who God is. Can you find much water? (Show a picture of a desert) > Soon, the Israelites ran out of water to drink. > Q: How do you think the people were feeling with no water to drink? > Q: What do you think they said to God? Read Numbers 20:2-5 > Q: Does that remind you of what they have done in the past? > Q: What should the Israelites have said to God?

	Read Numbers 20:9-11a
	> Q: Is that what God had told Moses to do? What had God told Moses to do?
	> Instead of speaking to the rock, Moses hit the rock.
	➤ He didn't obey God. Maybe he thought, "I don't think speaking to the rock is
	going to work, I'd better hit it instead. My way is better than God's way".
	➤ God's way is always the best way. If he says to do something, then that is always
	the best thing to do, even if we don't understand.
	> Q: What do you think happened after Moses disobeyed and hit the rock? Do you
	think any water came out?
	Read Numbers 20:11b
	> It did! Even though Moses had disobeyed God, God was still kind and made a big
	flood of water come out of the rock!
	➤ Moses and God's people had all behaved badly. But God was still kind and gave
	them what they needed.
	> But that didn't mean that Moses wasn't punished. Because he had disobeyed
	God and thought he knew better, he wasn't allowed to go into the promised
	land. He missed out, like the other Israelites.
So What?	> Sometimes we are tempted to think that God is just like us. But God is not like us.
	He never gets frustrated. He never hurts people because he has been hurt. God is
	always good and kind.
	Q: How does knowing that God is always good, and kind help you to trust him?
	How does it help you to obey, even when it is hard?
	Q: What do you want to say to God?

Instead, this is what they said
