BIG IDEA	The God who works for his people behind the scenes
Bible Reading	Numbers 22-24
Preparation	Read Numbers 22-24 The Israelites are now on the verge of entering the promised land. The attention shifts away from what they are doing and focusses on a Moabite king (Balak). He was rightly afraid of the Israelites and summons supernatural help through Balaam. The incident with the talking donkey vividly illustrates how foolish it is to try and thwart God's plans, particularly when it comes to hurting his people (2 Peter 2:15). There is heavy irony throughout the incident — a prophet, renowned for his insight, cannot see what a donkey can see! Despite this encounter, Balaam continues to try and manipulate God into doing what he wants (probably what the sacrifices are about). But God is committed to his people and cannot be turned from being on their side. There is no indication that the Israelites were aware that any of this was going on at the time (reminiscent of Job). When it was later revealed to them, the fact that their God was committed to fighting on their side, even when they were unaware there was a battle going on, must have been a huge encouragement as they faced their various challenges. Take home message: God fights on the side of his people — even when we can't see it. Prepare for "Getting Started": Find a picture of an animal (e.g. lion) creeping up on unsuspecting prey.
Getting Started	Show a picture of an animal (the prey). If possible, hide the animal stalking them. Talk about what they might have done that day, and what they are doing now. Show the animal that is stalking them. What is the danger? Does the first animal know about it? What are they thinking about (lunch?). What do you think will happen? Today we will find out about a time when God's people were in a situation a bit like this, facing terrible danger but unaware of it.
Finding Out 1. The unseen threat	 Recap last lesson: Q: What happened to the Israelites after they complained yet again? What did God tell Moses to do? What happened to people who looked at the snake? What did Jesus say that was a picture of? The Israelites carried on their journey to their new home. Finally, they made it back to the edge of the promised land. They camped on one side of the Jordan. They could see the promised land on the other side. While they were camped there, something was happening nearby that they knew nothing about Read Numbers 22:1-7 (Could read in parts – Balaam, Balak, God and Moabites) Q: Why did King Balak send for Balaam? What did he want him to do? Read Numbers 22:8-14 (Could read in parts – Balaam, Balak, God and Moabites) Q: What was God's answer to Balaam's question? What reason does he give? Despite all the Israelites' failings, God had chosen to bless them. Because he had chosen them, nothing could change his commitment to them.

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	Q: What does that tell you about God?
	Balak wasn't happy with this response, so he sent more important people and
	lots more money to persuade Balaam. Balaam agreed to go with them in the end,
	despite God's clear instruction that he wasn't to go.
	Read Numbers 22:21-35 (Could read in parts – Balaam, donkey, angel)
	Q: What do you find strange about this incident?
	A donkey could see more clearly than the prophet (someone who was known for
	being able to "see" things)! By using the donkey, God clearly showed how foolish
	Balaam's behaviour was – he wasn't even as smart as a donkey!
	Balaam tried to get around what he knew God wanted and do his own thing –
	that is always foolish!
	Remember, that the whole time this was happening, the Israelites had no idea
	about the danger they were in (Refer back to "Getting Started" activity).

protection	• Q: What was God's response to Balak's request to curse the Israelites (v.11)?
	Q: Has God said something similar to verse 10a to someone in the past?
	God made a promise to Abraham and his descendants. Because of that promise,
	God was committed to being on the side of the Israelites. God never changes his
	mind and never lies. The promises he makes to his people can never be broken
	Read Deuteronomy 23:4-5
	Q: What further reason is given here for why God chose to protect his people?
	God is on the side of his people because he has made an unbreakable promise to
	them, and because he loves them - no matter what comes against them.
	Balak asked Balaam 2 more times to curse the Israelites. Each time, the same
	thing happened. God made sure that the Israelites were blessed instead of cursed
	 Remember that the Israelites were still unaware of what was happening on the
	hills above them. Danger threatened them, God protected them from that
	danger, and they carried on eating their lunch! (Refer back to "Getting Started"
	activity – the difference in this case was that they were also rescued without
	them knowing about it!)
So What?	Q: Has God's attitude towards his people changed?
	Q: What does that mean for how he feels about you, if you are trusting him?
	God is completely committed to being on your side, because he has promised
	that he will be, and because he loves you - no matter what happens.
	If you are not yet trusting God, this is what you are missing out on!
	Q: Do you think we are always aware of the dangers threatening us? (Possibly
	talk about spiritual warfare and the way Satan would like to get at us)
	 Q: How does knowing that God is fighting for you, even when you are not aware
	of it, make you feel? How does it help you to be brave in living for him?
